Pastor's

Message

for Lent

I thought I knew pain.

I skinned my knee falling off my bike and had my

wisdom teeth removed.

I have disappointed others and have made an embarrassment of myself, living with the regret.

I've splinted broken thighs of others and have undergone extensive GI surgery myself.

I've sat in jail and cried with a sorrowful inmate and stood with them as they confessed their sins before the judge

and the world and received their sentence.

I held in my arms a sobbing grandmother who I had notified that her husband and five grandchildren were

killed in a car accident on the State highway.

I've held the hand of a beloved, dying parishioner while all the life support equipment was turned off and the curtains were drawn.

I'm living through joint replacement.

White hot, throbbing, unrelenting, sleep depriving, mind numbing.

Pain management was a thing, complete with leading researchers from right here in Rochester. Grand rounds hosted a full house of clinicians hoping to learn about the Holy Grail of a pain free recovery. Then there was the opioid epidemic.

Yeah, I've been the pastor for the convicted drug company CEO and I've buried the victims of overdose. The pain from around those dining room tables is enough to topple even the strongest, most faithful.

Pain; physical, emotional, spiritual. Pain is woven into the human condition and is as common to us as is death and taxes, as is a walker or a cane.

Pain is the great equalizer.

When I think about Lent, I think about pain.

God so loved the world that he couldn't stand by and watch it go to hell.

Our rebellious words and behaviors so pained our loving Creator, that our beloved heavenly Father sent us his Son. Jesus.

Last ditch effort? Hail Mary final play?

I don't know.

What I do know is this:

Jesus. Sent to us to remove the pain of the world.

Jesus. Sent to remove your pain and mine.

Jesus. No side effects, no unintended consequences, completely legal.

Jesus. Simply healing pain by our loving God.

Lent begins with a recognition of our mortal pain as ashes are imposed on our forehead.

Jesus survives the spiritual pain of temptation 40 days and 40 nights with the devil himself.

Jesus enters Holy Week and is pained to bid farewell to his followers, to face Peter who denied him, to look Judas in the eye before being betrayed unto death.

39 lashes.

Spit in the face.

Stripped bare, nailed to a cross, and lift high so all could see.

The pain of Jesus becomes his healing love.

Just as one cannot get to resurrection without first dying, so too, one cannot be freed of the pain of the world without the loving, healing presence of Jesus Christ.

Over these 40 days of Lent, abide in Christ.

Drink in his love.

Find freedom from the pain of the world.

Give thanks to God, our Heavenly Father, and his great love for you.

Suffer no more.



Board of Trustees: Capital Projects Update Thanks to the generosity of the Rush Church

Thanks to the generosity of the Rush Church congregation, more than \$90,587.51 has been received so far towards the Capital Stewardship Fund. This allows the Board of Trustees to move forward with several of the projects that were approved at the Church Charge Conference.

- Project #1 is the issue of drainage on the West side of the building. We have received recommendations on how best to proceed, and with that information the trustees will determine the best course of action. Then work can begin!
- 2) The fabric and materials have been purchased for the sanctuary chairs. We are currently looking for volunteers to assist with removing the old fabric and staples so the reupholstery work can begin. The newly recovered chairs will be placed in the sanctuary once enough of them have been completed. If you are willing to help "deconstruct" the chairs, please contact Cindy Gray at 585-334-0110, or talk to her at church.
- 3) The Board of Trustees reviewed the estimates and information provided from several area carpet installers. After meeting with individuals from the company and reviewing their proposals, the Trustees voted to hire Lima Carpet to replace the current carpet in the church lobby and café area with carpet tile. Work will begin as soon as the materials are available. Updates will be provided on Rush Tidings when we are able to set an actual date for the installation. Stay tuned!

Note and Update from Pastor Todd

Due to the many questions and concerns about my recent absence from the pulpit, it was decided a note and update as to my ventures was needed. After months of discomfort and pain in my left knee, I decided the time had come to have a total knee replacement. The surgery was on February 3 and was successful. I had expected to return to leading worship on Sunday, February 19, following rehabilitation at home. My recovery has been more painful and difficult than I anticipated. My physician and physical therapist have suggested that I'll be unable to drive and carry out normal activities for six weeks or more and to plan accordingly. Because of this, I have asked Pastor Lida Merrill to lead worship on February 19. I do plan to lead worship for Ash Wednesday and Sundays thereafter from a wheelchair until significant improvements are made. Please understand and accommodate these temporary limitations.

I will be working from home, holding meetings by appointment, phone or via Zoom video conferencing as able. Phone calls are appreciated, as I enjoy hearing your voice and having a human connection! I am finding rehabilitation is hard work and I'm often fatigued.

A pool of volunteers who can provide rides would be greatly appreciated. This is mostly for Sundays, but some other times rides may also be needed. Please contact George Gray at 585-334-0110 or see him at church if you are able to help.

My Spiritual Journey

I grew up in a tiny town with three churches, Catholic (majority of population went there), a Community (evangelical) and a Presbyterian, which my brother and I attended. My parents would go on Christmas Eve and when we had our confirmation. Two ladies at the end of our road would give us a ride to church. Winter attendance was maybe 12, Summer maybe 45. I learned about community support during this time.

I would go occasionally during college when asked. Dave and I both knew it was important to be married in the church but didn't attend regularly wherever we had an apartment. When we moved to a small community, we attended an UCC for 10 years to get to know people our area.

When we moved to a different location in the area, I was asked to interview and got the job for the Methodist church office administrator. I became very involved with activities with this community. Also, here in Rush and Myrtle Beach we have found a community with the church. This was what I thought of church, as a community; made up with a lot of different personalities. I was just scratching the surface with my relationship with God.

I learned a lot about my relationship with God with and against these personalities. When I was in my thirties, God up until this point was an authority, the judge. When I started doing small studies with people, and able to have discussions, did I realize that God was supposed to be as a father figure, and I could have conversations with him not just learn about him and pray thanks and forgiveness.

I took Disciples 1 and 2, from different ministers, where I learned the Bible context can be interpreted slightly differently. As I continued my journey, my personal experience with God grew stronger and conversational prayers were more daily than the weekly forgiveness or thankfulness.

I very much enjoy small study groups where I can share, question and develop my understanding on my journey. My personal relationship with God and my faith grew as I learned, listened, questioned, struggled, and shared in discussions with others.

I enjoy sharing the weekly community gathering of Sunday service, the rituals, messages and music with the large family. I have grown in my faith with the small groups and studies. My faith journey is still ongoing, my personal relationship with God keeps me on my toes, mine is now interactive instead of surface asking for forgiveness and giving thanks.

Lately I have wanted to only have a relationship with God and not humankind, God has been talking with me. In a sermon this verse: 1 John 4:20 "Whoever claims to love God yet hates a brother or sister is a liar. For whoever does not love their brother or sister, whom they have seen, cannot love God, whom they have not seen." was discussed. Also, in our small group a relationship question was "what does love require of me?" Andy Stanley offers, this may require you to pick up phone and rebuild a bridge you burned. You were right! But being Right wasn't what love required of you. Jesus commanded that we are love our neighbor. So, God has been listening to my conversations and is giving me answers, teaching, and encouraging me to continue my journey on his terms.

Capítal Stewardshíp Campaign Update

As of Wednesday, February 22, we have received \$269,200.00 or 53.84% in pledges towards our \$500,000.00 goal. Of the amount pledged, we have received \$90,587.51 of which \$3,690.38 has been spent on fabric to reupholster the sanctuary chairs. Pledges continue to be accepted. Even if you haven't made a pledge, donations to the Capital Stewardship Campaign are gratefully accepted.





Mission and Outreach

As I prepare for a visit to South Africa April 13-28, I am filled with gratitude for RUMC's facilitating our



partnership with Zululand Hospice Association (ZHA). It started 20 years ago when Lifetime Care Hospice was twinned with ZHA. We have visited almost every year taking medical supplies and gifts for staff and patients. We shop and bring back craft items to sell to raise funds.

ZHA has purchased vehicles from our donations in the past, but now need our funds to survive. PEPFAR funds, UNAIDS, etc. are gone. There is no Medicare Hospice Benefit in South Africa and the indigent patients do not have insurance. Neither can many afford adequate nutrition, transportation to the clinic and in some cases a bed. ZHA provides for these needs. With this assist, medical attention and loving care some recover while others do not.



We take so much for granted that is not available in the Kwa-Zulu Natal – postal service, safe travel, no need for walls and locked gates around our homes. Those who have electricity experience load-shedding – the power is turned off for periods of time. Temperatures were over 100° in past weeks.

Robert F. Morneau wrote, "Many of our sisters and brothers are born into poverty or oppressed by social systems, these people find little joy and

peace. If they are fortunate in avoiding violence they still must struggle with resentment and bitterness in their awareness of the consumption and materialism of the wealthy."

The level of crime, carjackings and protests we hear about validate this truth, but we witness the dedication and loving care of the hospice staff. The patients' quality of life is improved by the contributions of Careworkers, Happiness and Noreen, staff and the Board. On



my last visit, the mother of a patient cried, "God, don't let these people die!"

We can no longer hold our fund-raisers in the dozen offices we used to travel to several times a year due to Covid and Rochester Regional's absorption of Lifetime Care.

I am extremely grateful for RUMC's hosting fundraisers, for all who shop and donate and for Barb

Kingsley's collecting the funds and wiring them to ZHA. Witnessing the work of ZHA and knowing they battle for funds weighs heavily on my heart. Your contributions matter immensely.

When the Apostles were debating whether or not Jewish laws needed to be practiced by new Gentile Christians, "they asked only that we would remember the poor which was certainly something I was willing to do." The Apostle Paul, Galatians 2:10.



Thank you for your willingness to do the same, especially the donations that help make up for the gap in the fund-raisers we are no longer able to schedule.
