A Note from Pastor Kyle

Did you know that February has to some been considered the "Month of Love". Sure you did; of course



you did. And I am confident you know why. Perhaps, because we honor Saint Valentine... a saint of the 3rd century whose crime against humanity was to wed love filled couples against the "interests" of the state. According to legend and tradition (and according to the History Channel); on February 14, around the year A.D. 270, Valentinea holy priest in Rome in the days of Emperor Claudius II - is said to have been executed. Under

so loved

the world.

the rule of Claudius the Cruel, Rome was involved in many unpopular and bloody campaigns. The emperor had to maintain a strong army, but was having a difficult time getting soldiers to join his military leagues. Claudius believed that Roman men were unwilling to join the army because of their strong attachment to their wives and families. To get rid of the problem, Claudius banned all marriages and engagements in

Rome. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret.

But wait, there's more. Legend has it that while in jail he (or another Valentine of the same era) fell for the jailer's daughter... some go as far as saying they were in love. And in his cell (or the cell of the other Christian by the name Valentine... jailed and killed in the same era) they found a note after his death addressed to her. He signed it: "From Your Valentine".

Hold on, there is a twist. Long before the first of no fewer than three "St Valentines," there existed a Roman pagan festival called "Lubercalia". No one knows the exact origin of Lupercalia, but it has been traced back as far as the 6th century B.C. This Roman festival day was held in hopes of warding off evil spirits and infertility.

In the late 5th century A.D., Pope Gelasius I renounced/eliminated the pagan celebration of Lupercalia and declared February 14 a day to celebrate the martyrdom of Saint Valentine instead. The Feast day of St. Valentine began - the birth of a new holiday. And how wonderful; they were able to link the Christian faith to the similar "spirit" of the pagan festival.

Ironically, the Roman Catholic Church removed St. Valentine's Feast Day from it's calendar in 1969. Feasts of the saints, according to the Church, should commemorate the very mysteries of salvation, the "universal Church (should) commemorate saints who are truly of universal importance."

I confess I find intellectual amusement that "the Church" would create a feast to eliminate something that was happening in society... and then cancel it when they feel it is not of "universal importance!" to society. But wait, I have more thoughts on that. Even if that were to make senses – how is the expression/practice/experience of a day of love not warrant the category of universal importance?

John 3:16 For God so [WHAT] oh yeah... loved the world...

And lest you hear me attacking the Roman Catholic Church, let me add and be clear: I have heard time and again people in communities I have served complaining that Valentine's Day is only for the "Card Companies!" I

hear time and again people who don't like the commercialism of a "not real" holiday.

I see such great opportunity for the church. What a chance for reclaimed evangelism – a chance to

expand our evangelism. Perhaps the Roman Catholic Church no longer needs a feast day to remember and spread the power of love... but the Gospel mandate given by Christ in the 28th

Chapter of Matthew tells me to "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations... teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you." And what was that command...? "To Love!"

Our service will begin at 7:00PM in the church sanctuary. Ashes will be imposed on the forehead or hand of the willing. Communion will be served.






What "We" Believe and "How" We Have Come to Believe It

Capital Stewardship Campaign Update

Total Paid

As of Monday, January 27, 2025, we have received \$269,200.00 or 53.84% in pledges towards our \$500,000.00 goal. Of the amount pledged, we have received \$181,092.11 of which \$112,466.23 has been spent on fabric to reupholster the sanctuary chairs, for the materials and installation of the carpet and baseboard in the lobby, sitting area and halls, for repairs to gutters and payment for drainage work in the parking lot and west

side of the building and patching, sealing and striping the driveway and parking lot. Eleven thousand two hundred seventy dollars (\$11,270.00), not pledged, of this total has been designated for an electronic sign. Pledges continue to be accepted. Even if you haven't made a pledge, donations to the Capital Stewardship Campaign are gratefully accepted.

Water for South Sudan

Nine years ago, I was going through a bit of a crisis and was asking the Lord for guidance. I wanted to contribute some skills I had picked up over the years to do some type of "good." After some failed attempts on my part, Diana Balch, longtime member now in California with Glenn, let me know that Water For South Sudan (WFSS) was looking for an Operations Coordinator. This turned out to be a really good fit for me and for WFSS. It is truly an answered prayer.

WFSS started as Water For Sudan, before South Sudan became the world's youngest country. It was started by former "lost boy" Salva Dut with the help of Glenn and others. Salva is a natural leader and at the tender age of 11 fled the conflict to a refugee camp in Ethiopia. From the WFSS website: "With little adult supervision, the boys developed their own systems of organization. That was to prove vital when in 1991 they were driven from the camp by a new conflict. Salva was 17 by this point, and he'd become a leader amongst the boys. In total there were 17,000 of them. They set off in groups, first back towards Sudan, then south, towards Kenya.

When they emerged from the wilderness after many months, aid workers were astonished to find them still alive. They shared their story with the world. The United Nations recommended almost 4,000 of the Lost Boys for resettlement in the US, and Salva's name was among them." Salva settled in Rochester, one of those immigrants with no skills to offer America. In his words, "I didn't know anything." Salva was taken in by a family, supported by St. Paul's Episcopal Church, and went to MCC to learn things.

Several years later he learned that his father was alive but very sick from a water-borne disease. Salva went back home to see his father. His father survived and Salva was motivated to drill a well for his village. South Sudan is blessed with an aquifer of clean water under much of the country. In 2004 Water For Sudan was formed and today over 650 wells have been drilled bringing clean water to nearly a half-million people.

Aside from having clean water, 100s of thousands of girls are now free of the daily task of fetching water from miles away. This task is not only dangerous due to predatory animals and people, but it prevented them from attending school. They were destined to a life of being pregnant to supply babies to their husband; children are the only form of social security available in a subsistence economy.

WFSS is involved in all aspects of <u>WA</u>ter, <u>Hygiene</u> and <u>Sanitation</u>, or WASH. WFSS has trained many people and trainers about Hygiene including the germ theory of disease and has supplied Sanitation in the form of latrines to people that have never had access to a toilet.

I work with WFSS almost daily and have visited South Sudan four times now. I mainly offer organizational tools, ideas and technologies to our talented people there. It is arrogant to think that we can supply western solutions to them if they would only listen. We can offer ideas and then work with them to implement the one's they think will work in their circumstance. That is what I have been doing with them and it has truly been an answered prayer.



Angel Tree Ministry Update

Thank you to all who donated gifts to the Angel Tree Program. On December 6, I met Angel Tree Organizer Maureen Hill with the gifts for 15 children at the Salvation Army in Rochester. Inside this location was a large room

staged with the gifts for distribution to the designated families. Maureen was enthusiastic and grateful for our church's involvement.

I very much enjoyed participating in this experience and hope to do it again!

What to Do In Bad Weather?


The weekday winter weather closing policy of Rush United Methodist Church has changed. We will no longer


