

A Note from Pastor Kyle

I was at a district wide clergy gathering the other day and the question was asked by the program's organizer;



"In the past... when you first arrived at a new church, what did you do to set yourself up - in a positive way - for your future?" Having moved so many times over the last 27 years I thought this would be a question I could hit out of the park... But, the best answer came from someone else. And the answer was something that was a bit unsettling to me. I knew he was right, but I also knew it was not easy. He said, "early on - don't avoid talking

about the hard things..." and then he said, "You know, like money!"

I have read, studied, talked, counseled and preached about money. I have saved, spent, found, lost, earned, inherited and given money away. But never did I come across a better truth about money then when reading Adam Hamilton's book "Enough". And who would have guessed, he found this truth in the word of God. "Money should never be an end in itself. Rather, it should be

a means for accomplishing our life purpose. Money itself is not bad. It is not the root of all evil. According to the Bible, **"the love** (obsessing over) **of money is a root of all kinds of evil" (1 Timothy 6:10b).** Rev. Hamilton goes on to remind us that money is a "tool to be used to accomplish the greater purposes God has for our lives." That leads to my first and toughest question I have for us to answer during this stewardship process; "What is the greater purpose God has for our church?"

I believe part of that answer involves what we have been doing. Over the last number of months, I have heard about and seen all types of great things. I was flabbergasted at the scope as well as the outcome of our 80^{th} iteration of the Turkey Dinner. Then there is Trunk – R – Treat, All Saint's Day jumping soon after into Advent. During Advent we will be sponsoring no less than three separate outreach care programs helping many both locally and from across the globe have a brighter holiday season. I am preparing to begin a Faith Formation project with our youth that perhaps will lead to a number of them being confirmed and welcomed as "professing members" of our church. We have other adult classes underway and a few more developing, ready to launch at the completion of our stewardship campaign.

Am I the only one that hears about all the incredible work projects "we used to do?" I think I have heard a desire to do away with that "use to" part of the story and lean into the "we" and "do" part. There are needs locally, throughout our state/country and our world. I am so excited that Erma has extended an invitation for me to join her next May in South Africa. I believe it is true that you can hear about it, but once you experience it... that is when it becomes real.

What is the greater purpose God has for our church? I have listed just a few of the greater purposes for us here at Rush UMC. We are living it. And money is only one of the tools we need in order to not only "live" but to "mature". We need people willing to put that tool into action. We need people to organize, lead and attend classes. We need people to find, coordinate and swing hammers at work project sites. We need cooks and servers and food for the hungry. We need compassionate listeners to support those who need much or who have lost everything

Let me finish by simply saying this: During this Stewardship campaign we could just talk about and worry

about and focus on... money. However, I believe doing so would be missing the mark of what we are called to do. We would be missing the opportunity to develop, support and enhance our purpose.

Red Bird Mission

Thank you for your past support of Red Bird Mission. Last year Upper New York sent over 2800 shoeboxes, over 100 new sheet sets and bedspreads, as well as numerous books, school supplies, and cleaning supplies to Red Bird Mission in Beverly, KY. Red Bird Missionary Conference is one of three United Methodist missionary conferences in the United States.

The need is even greater this year.

Our goal for 2024 is to transport at least 3,500 shoeboxes and other supplies to the Red Bird Mission the last week of November.

There are two different styles of shoeboxes-adult and children.

Shoebox items should be put in clear plastic shoeboxsized storage containers with locking lids.

Do not wrap the shoeboxes.

Clearly label each shoebox so they know who the intended recipient is for the items.

Shoeboxes, content list and box labels are available in the church lobby.

Return shoeboxes to church by Nov 17 to allow time for pickup and delivery.

Donations are needed to cover the cost of renting two trucks to deliver the supplies to the Red Bird Mission.

This month I am thinking of the tremendous number of blessings for which we are thankful.

1. Our Lord Jesus was willing to leave his home in



heaven, surely a place of far greater beauty, comfort, and safety, than we can begin to imagine. He was willing to place himself in the greatest vulnerability – with a young, inexperienced mother who delivered the Messiah without family or midwife in attendance. He went on to show us how to live and died to procure our salvation. Then "God raised him up! God freed him from death's

dreadful grip, since it was impossible for death to hang on to him." Acts 2:24 Praise God!

2. I am grateful for our living in an area of comfort and safety unlike so many of our sisters and brothers. We are far more comfortable than many around the world due to more than enough food, plentiful amount of water, sanitary facilities, heated homes, warm clothes, etc. Just half the world has adequate sanitation facilities. When Jane Ashburner, Builties. When Jane for Scheland herming



Palliative Care Manager of Zululand hospice visited her son in Colorado, she said, "Erma! People have furniture on their porches and Amazon leaves packages!" In South Africa Jane lives within walls and



locked gates.

3. I am grateful for family. My grandparents and parents lived the teaching to "live simply so that others may live" and I am grateful for their example.

4. I am often overwhelmed by the beauty and variety of creation. While camping in the Adirondacks, when the sun shone, we had clouds of insects - blue, fuzzy-butt wooly aphids! Our trees, flowers, birds, animals, etc.

bring much joy and interest. The opportunity to go on safari is always exciting and reason for giving thanks.

Western North Carolina is a lovely place, but is now inaccessible due to roads being washed away, littered with debris overwhelmed with grief for the lives of those lost. We are blessed to live in an area not often threatened by earthquakes, hurricanes, flooding.



5. We are blessed by our healthcare systems. Because of my travels to South Africa a verse from Psalms 128:6 caught my attention, "And may you see your children's children." This is the expectation of most of us. However, we see many patients with Zululand Hospice staff for whom this is not the case. We saw 3 women in the early 40s with cancer in



May and 2 died within weeks. Often grandmothers are raising their children's children.

6. I am SO grateful for my church family, Rush UMC. I thank God for so much generosity of time, talent, dedication and funds. The building is a

blessing to us, PromiseLand families and the community. I am thankful Pastor Kyle and Kris were willing to be uprooted and move to western NY. Thank you, Dan and Kathy for making



the 80th Turkey Dinner possible. I can't begin to include everyone who is in leadership, who teach, cook, clean-up, keep Super Sale going, visit homebound, bake, etc. so I will stop here. But I cannot close without

expressing huge appreciation for your response when special needs are raised. It was a profoundly wonderful feeling to be able to wire the funds given in response to the thefts at the orphanage.
