A Note from Pastor Todd

WE ARE GLAD YOU'RE HERE



"Welcome to our church! I'm glad you are here."

This is our elevator tagline we say to visitors and people with unfamiliar faces. Do we really mean it? I'm skeptical until proven otherwise. Prove me wrong!

Let's weigh the benefits and risks of welcoming new people into our community of faith with a few 'back of the napkin' lists.

Benefits:

More people means growth, and growth is good

More people means it is more likely to have more children, youth, and

families

The bigger the church the less likely it is to fail

The more who contribute to our expenses, the less the financial burden on me

Many hands make light work. We will

have more volunteers to get things done Maybe the 20% of us who do all the work will be able to turn the reigns over and step back and relax

New ideas!

Risks:

More people means my voice and vote counts for less. I don't want to give up the power or control I have

New people might bring controversy with them. They may not think or believe like I do.

New people bring the possibility of new needs to an already saturated environment

I like the friends I've got; why add more?

New ideas, bah-humbug! We've never done it that way before.

The denomination is splitting; let's wait it out before we welcome newcomers

Rarely do I hear members and friends of the church answering with Jesus' command: "Go make disciples of all the earth, baptizing them ..., teaching them all I have taught you." Baptize those God has provided. Teach them Jesus. It couldn't be more simple, yet, we make it so hard.

Forget the numbers; attendance, membership, budget. Make disciples, Jesus commands. Lead people to Jesus and introduce them to their new best friend. If so moved, invite them to baptism and membership.

Growth and vitality come one person at a time.

We must show up; not just virtually, behind the safety of our tablets, laptops, and fluffy slippers. We have to physically get in the car and commit to come to church.

Take notice; who is new and who is old and familiar. Spend the majority of your time taking notice of new

visitors and warmly welcome them. Ask them to talk about themselves. We all love to talk about ourselves. Before you walk away, make certain you have communicated the fact that they are known, accepted, and welcomed.

Do you have their contact information? Share your contact information FIRST. Make an open invitation to contact you at any time. Share contact information with the church office when you receive it.

Do visitors and guests feel like their needs are supported? If you've been chucking it up with your own friends and cliques, you probably never noticed their dietary needs, hearing loss, or mobility challenges that are

appearing in our pews. People who are turned away go elsewhere.

Your pastor shouldn't have to say it, but I will anyways. Make certain new visitors and members are made to feel cared for, befriended, needed, and loved. Have you done your part to create a positive attitude and share the blessings of our

congregation? The more positive points of connections, the better.

Congregations that are not intentional about discipleship wither and die. The reward is great for those who hear the command of Jesus and faithfully follow. Stop with the numbers game. Start with the people game. Make room for everyone, and I mean EVERYONE, to belong. Our ancestors will thank you, and so will God.

Rush Church will be collecting donations in May for the Rush-Henrietta Area Food Terminal (RHAFT). During this time of uncertainty, RHAFT is very busy distributing food to families in the Rush-Henrietta area.

RHAFT gratefully accepts all non-perishable food items, personal hygiene products, and paper goods. However, the following items are especially needed: 100% Juice: bottles, boxes, packs; Jello and Pudding; Instant Mashed Potatoes, Mayo and Condiments; Coffee: instant and ground (no K-cups); Fresh Vegetables; Canned Meat/Fish Products: Ham, Spam, Tuna, etc; Hamburger/Tuna Helper; Fruits: cans, jars, packs, etc; Toiletries/Bar Soap/Paper Goods.

You can bring items to the church Monday – Friday from 7AM - 5PM and leave them in the box in the vestibule or on Sundays. We will see they are taken to the center.

Cash donations are also appreciated for perishable food items such as meat and milk. Please make your check payable to Rush United Methodist Church, write in the memo area "RHAFT" and mail it to PO Box 49, Rush, NY 14543 or deliver it to the church. A check will be sent to them at the end of the month.

The need for emergency supplies of food, especially protein, personal hygiene products and paper goods is constant. Thank you for your continuing support of our community's emergency food cupboard.

Peace with Justice Sunday

Peace with Justice Sunday is traditionally celebrated on Trinity Sunday (the first Sunday after Pentecost), which this year is June 4. One of The United Methodist Church's six special Sunday offerings, Peace with Justice Sunday supports annual conference ministries as well as global denominational work.

The offering received for Peace with Justice Sunday is divided in half. Half is used in The Upper New York annual conference and half supports the ministries of the General Board of Church and Society. Peace with Justice Sunday funds are used through United Methodist channels to:

relate the gospel of Jesus Christ to the church, communities and the world in which members live;

bring the whole of human life into conformity with God's will; and

show that reconciliation involves personal, social and civic righteousness.

Peace with Justice Sunday is an opportunity for United Methodists to highlight the Social Principles that are an integral part of our Wesleyan heritage. Special envelopes will be on Eagle Island near the offering plates.

Last month I wrote about Mary's extravagant generosity in anointing Jesus' feet with expensive perfume in John 12. Another of Jesus' statements during that encounter was, "You will always have the poor among you,.."

Jesus' words have been used as justification for being



complacent about "the poor among us." Is it not an indictment?
Deuteronomy 15:10 states, "Give generously to needy persons. Don't resent giving to them because it is this very thing that will lead to the LORD your God's blessing you in all you

do and work at." Verse 8 "there won't be any poor among you because the LORD will bless you ..."

Discussion about the inequality in the world can be shut down by stating that Jesus said, "The poor will always be among us." But Jesus was not excusing the presence of the poor. He knows

presence of the poor. He knows full well that His Father has provided enough for everyone. It is the unrighteousness of those who have more than enough that perpetuates the presence of the poor among us. If all Christians were living as God commanded there would be no poor. It's our fault, not God's.

Lawn Mowing and Maintenance Volunteers

IT'S LAWN MOWIN' SEASON AGAIN!!! We have a small but dedicated group of volunteers and a variety of mowers to choose from. Are you interested in mowing or helping with maintenance? We can use the help. You would be surprised how relaxing an hour on the zero-turn is. Just don't get stuck in the mud.

HOW IT WORKS: The lawn is broken up into sections. We typically have preferred sections but cover for each other as necessary. It ends up being weekly-ish if you are a full-time mower. We coordinate scheduling by

text. We have preferred days and times, but weather can throw us off. We do our best to cover for each other and get around the weather.

MOWERS: We have 3 mowers based on your comfort level - Ex Mark commercial zero-turn for the big stuff, push mower for the little stuff, garden tractor (moved from the parsonage last year) for the medium stuff. Where do you fit in?

TEMPS: Can't mow all the time? Can you fill in in a pinch? July is always difficult. Can we keep you on a temp list?

MAINTENANCE: Perhaps you can help with oil/filter changes or blade changing/sharpening.

Keeping track of hours on the zero-turn would be valuable. We have 5 or so 5-gallon gas cans that need to be kept filled. (Best if you have a trailer to move these all at once.)

WEEDWHACKERS: We haven't always kept on top of this. Perhaps this is your calling. The church has a weedwhacker or use your own.

CHAIN SAWS: Do you have one? Can we put you on a

list? Our trails along the creek are very messy right now and could use some attention.

TRAINING: Would you like to try the zero turn? I am always available by email, phone, or text.

I attended the 40th Annual Conference of the Professional Administrators of The United Methodist Connectional Structure (PAUMCS) that was held at the Embassy Suites Airport in Bloomington, Minnesota, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, April 27, 28 and 29. The

Minnesota Chapter of PAUMCS served as the conference host. Those attending the conference worshipped, learned, and networked with other church professionals from across the denomination.

The theme of the conference was "Both Constant and Changing" Each day was a different focus. Thursday was "The Differences are Real" with Jody Pfarr, Friday was "Change, Conflict, and Bad Behavior" with Rev. Susan Nienaber, Saturday was "Open, Welcoming, and Safe" with Rev.

Chris Carr and "Putting It All Together" with Rev. Cynthia Williams. The seminars were uplifting and informative.

Jody Pfarr spoke, through experience, insight and storytelling, about bringing awareness of how different each of us may be and how important this is when trying to work with one another. She then took the next step of exploring to find points of connections that unlock potential.

Rev Susan Nienaber shared with us lessons learned and practical techniques for moving beyond crisis intervention and restoring positive relations.

Rev. Chris Carr, Diakon Security Consulting, shared very practical suggestions for churches wanting to be both open and secure. He offered the suggestion of developing

a "theology of security" that can inspire change and challenge the mindset of what it means to create both safe and inclusive communities.



Rev. Cynthia Williams spoke on managing to meet the requirements, requests, recommendations, and everything else that comes at us within our limited time at the office. She offered some time management tips and tricks to help achieve this goal.

We also worshipped, celebrated Holy Communion, ate meals together and had time for reconnecting with former friends and making new ones. These were all an important part of the conference.

The mission focus was Emma Norton Services. Emma Norton Services is a radically compassionate and inclusive organization, using evidence-based policies. "We meet clients where they are and walk with them on their journey of recovery." Emma Norton Services provides transformational housing and growth for women and families on their journey to recovery. PAUMCS members and friends collected and gave over \$1,000.00 in cash and gift cards to Emma Norton Services.


CONNECTIONAL STRUCTURE
